Reopening of Church Target Date - September

The question that everyone in the church is asking is, "When will we be able to assemble for public worship and other activities in the church again?" The answer is not before September.

The office of the Eastern Synod of the ELCIC, through Bishop Pryse, has sent out a letter to the congregations informing them that September is the earliest we can reopen the congregations for worship again. This is a decision of the National Church, the ELCIC. The decision to re-open in

September comes out of an abundance of caution and after much consideration. Bishop Pryse states in his letter, "I fully recognize that the four provincial jurisdictions that our synod encompasses will each establish different schedules for the easing of restrictions. In addition, it is possible that regional distinctions might be established within individual provinces. Still, I believe that there is great value in all of us anticipating a more distant horizon for potential reopening than we might be hoping is for." In his letter the Bishop

further states, "As such, it my strong recommendation that our synod's congregations not contemplate initiating in-person worship experiences within our church buildings until the beginning of September at the earliest.

As we wait patiently for the time of reopening of our congregation for worship and other activities, Council and I wish to urge our members to continue to stay in touch with the church and each other through the on-line worship services, email, telephone, social media and through the various networks people have established to stay in touch with each other before and since the lock-down.

Financially, the congregation is managing to meet its commitments. This is partly members have been because conscientious about keeping their financial stewardship to the church by sending their offerings. Members have been dropping off, mailing in their offerings, as well as through the Pre-Authorised Remittances(PARS) system. If you have not been able to keep up your stewardship to the church and would like to do so you may use any of the above ways. If you wish to know more about the PARS system, please contact the church office for information

Council and I wish to let everyone know that we are doing everything possible to keep the church healthy and it good order by carrying out all its administrative, missional and ministry activities as much as is needed and possible in the present situation.

Not Even The Gates Of Hell

It is ironic that the church all around the world had their doors closed to public worship on Pentecost Sunday, which was last Sunday. The irony lies in the fact that Pentecost is the day the Church was born. The Holy Spirit came on the Day of Pentecost. On that day, as at all Pentecost time in those days, the Jewish people gathered in Jerusalem from all over the Roman Empire to celebrate the festival of Pentecost. Those people spoke

many different languages. When the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples they spoke in many languages as the Spirit enabled them. The people heard the disciples speaking in their own languages, even though the disciples were Galileans and knew perhaps only one language, or two. Speaking in tongues, the disciples proclaimed the "mighty deeds of God". Three thousand people were baptized that day after they heard Peter's sermon. The church was born that day.

The COVID 19 pandemic, has for all intent and purposes, brought the entire world to an abrupt slow down if not halt since March of this year. The Church had to close their doors to public worship and any kind of gatherings. Churches responded to this forced but necessary closure by turning to the internet,

social media and various other ways to reach people with the gospel and continue to provide spiritual nurture and care. Nevertheless people miss the public gatherings to worship, fellowship, study the bible, pray and the many other things people do at church. The question being asked is, "When will we be able to gather again in church like we did in normal times?" This question is answered in our page 1 article.

The church is being affected in many ways, both positive and negative, by this pandemic. One of the positive things is that the church will begin to use the internet and social media more effectively and widely in its mission and ministry. Negatively, the shut- down will cause many congregations to enter into a financial crisis, from which many will find it

difficult to recover, at least for a long time to come. No matter what happens the Church will survive this pandemic.

The Church has faced crises before. It is no stranger to persecution, oppression and suppression by the powers that be.  - May donations were expected to fall as well but were actually above April at \$9,120 due to timing.
- (2) Excludes the positive impact of the receipt of anticipated wage subsidies (net \$5,400) and the payment of the annual insurance premium approximately \$7,500.
